Chamber hosts health care seminar

The only thing we know for sure about health care reform is that we don't know everything.

That was one of the key points made by Elizabeth Arenales, an attorney and health care expert from the Colorado Center for Law and policy.

Arenales spoke to a group of nearly 30 Craig residents June 23 at a Craig Chamber of Commerce business forum.

Many people are starting to understand the contents of the sweeping reform, passed by Congress March 23, but how the legislation will be implemented depends largely on how the policies are written by the Secretary of Health and Human Services and how each state chooses to implement their portion of the mandate, Arenales said.

She said there will be a lot of opportunity for Colorado residents to have input on how the state's implementation looks.

Highlights of Arenales' presenta-



tion included:

- Employers with more than 50 employees will be required to offer a workplace-sponsored insurance plan by 2014. Those that do not, will be fined \$2,000 per full-time employee with the first 30 employees exempted.

Employers who do offer health care coverage to their employees are eligible for a tax

credit. There are several online tax credit calculators available.

Individuals whose cost of health care is more than 8 percent of their income and small businesses will be eligible to purchase insurance from an insurance exchange.

Participation in the exchange is not mandated. See page 15 for an implementation timeline and additional details.

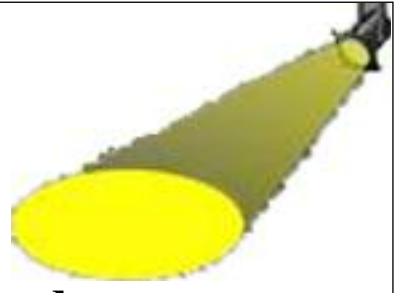

Health care reform: Timeline of key provisions and implementation

Key Provisions at a Glance

- Insurance companies** are prohibited from denying coverage based on a pre-existing condition. There are caps on deductibles and annual out-of-pocket spending is capped at \$6,000.
- Medicare** will be changed to include private Medicare Advantage plans. It is estimated they will pay 14 percent more than doctors.
- The bill forces individuals making more than \$500,000 and \$1 million for couples, to a 3.4 percent tax.
- Provides tax credits for individuals between 138 and 400 percent (filing scale) of the Federal Poverty Level. There are also tax incentives for small businesses.
- If provided, it prohibits federal funds from covering abortions. Women would need to purchase either the insurance purchased on the exchange if they wanted that coverage.
- The bill includes mandates for individuals to purchase and for businesses to provide health insurance or pay a fee. Individual penalty is 2.5 percent of gross income unless they get a waiver. Businesses that don't offer insurance pay a fee equal to 0.9 percent of their payroll. Businesses with a payroll of less than \$200,000 are exempt from the mandate.
- Creates a public health insurance option and a national exchange for the uninsured and small businesses to purchase health insurance. The Secretary of Health and Human Services would negotiate rates with doctors and hospitals an reimbursement rates.

A 10 Year Timeline

- 2010:** In the year 2010, there would be three major changes to the ACA. 1. Insurance companies would no longer be allowed to deny coverage to children with pre-existing illnesses. 2. Children would be able to stay on their parents' insurance policies until they turn 26 years old. 3. Medicare recipients would fall into a new coverage pool and get a 2.9% rebate. Other changes include: • A 3.8% tax on higher earners, which will increase the cost of that service. • A decision that lower middle class individuals for 3 months will receive a subsidy to enroll in high-risk insurance pools. All new businesses must offer minimum essential coverage and coverings from employers. • Small businesses with fewer than 25 employees would receive up to a 25 percent tax credit for providing health insurance to their employees.
- 2011:** In 2011, the new health care bill will make changes to individual mandate and penalties for later updates. The smaller children's health care bill will pay for the new health care bill will get a 20 percent discount on some things. In 2011, a new financing program will also be implemented to help pay for the upcoming changes. There are additional funds from a Health Savings Account for non-qualified expenses will increase by 5 to 10 percent. Employees will also need to start including the cost of health care in employee's W-2 forms.
- 2012-2013:** In 2012, the new health care bill will also include a 2nd option to Medicare to which private, set rates based on the quality, rather than quantity of health care services. Health insurers will also be banned from charging different rates to customers based on gender. In 2012, many of the new rules and their cost will pay for the new health care bill will get a 20 percent discount on some things. In 2012, a new financing program will also be implemented to help pay for the upcoming changes. There are additional funds from a Health Savings Account for non-qualified expenses will increase by 5 to 10 percent. Employees will also need to start including the cost of health care in employee's W-2 forms.
- 2014:** In 2014, the majority of Americans will gain benefits from the new health care bill. Exchanges will be established to help individuals with health care or small businesses get their health care coverage — and insurance companies will be forced to provide coverage on the basis of pre-existing conditions. Medicare will be required to cover all Americans with income up to 133 percent of the federal poverty level (about \$21,900 per year for a family of 3). Small businesses will also receive a tax credit to help them provide coverage to their employees. The insurance industry will also be required to pay a national fee to help pay for the coverage that will cover all citizens that cannot otherwise receive insurance. In addition to providing subsidies and guaranteed coverage for most citizens, the new health care bill will also require that most people have health insurance. There will be a fee for not carrying insurance of some sort. An independent Medicare board will also be created to help curb the costs if the costs rise more quickly than inflation.
- 2015-2018:** In 2015, the new health care bill will simply continue the new coverage, fees and their cost are created in previous years. In 2016, the penalty for individuals who do not purchase health insurance will rise to a \$695 minimum. In 2017, businesses that have more than 100 employees will be allowed to participate in the state health care exchange. In 2018, a new state-based "budget plan" that generally provides more than \$21.9 billion of coverage for a family.
